Earning an Ohio High School Diploma

Graduation Requirements

There is no one-size-fits-all way to graduate. Ohio gives you several pathways to qualify for a high school diploma. Choose the way that works best for you!

To earn a high school diploma in Ohio, you must complete the courses shown below and then choose a pathway on the right to show that you are ready for college or a job. Here's what you need to do to graduate. Your school counselor will give you more details.

Complete Courses

Take and earn a state minimum of 20 credits in specific subjects.

English language arts	4 credits
Health	½ credit
Mathematics	4 credits
Physical education	½ credit
Science	3 credits
Social studies	3 credits
Electives	5 credits

Other Requirements

You also must receive instruction in economics and financial literacy and complete at least two semesters of fine arts. Your district may require more than 20 credits to graduate.

Show That You Are Ready

Use at least one pathway to show that you are ready for college or a job.

Ohio's State Tests

Earn at least 18 points on seven end-of-course state tests. Endof-course tests are:

Algebra I or Integrated Math I English I
Geometry or Integrated Math II English II
American Government Biology
American History

Each test score earns you up to five graduation points. You must have a minimum of four points in math, four points in English and six points across science and social studies. Your school and district receive grades on the Ohio School Report Cards for all students' scores and participation on state tests.

Industry credential and workforce readiness

Earn a minimum of 12 points by receiving a State Board of Education-approved, industry-recognized credential or group of credentials in a single career field and earn the required score on WorkKeys, a work-readiness test. The state of Ohio will pay one time for you to take the WorkKeys test.

College and career readiness tests

Earn remediation-free scores in mathematics and English language arts on either the ACT or SAT.

The Ohio Department of Higher Education works with Ohio's universities to set the remediation-free scores for the ACT and SAT tests. Periodically, for a variety of reasons, these scores may be adjusted. For all high school juniors, the remediation-free scores set by Feb. 1 of their junior year will be used to meet their graduation requirement. The most up-to-date information regarding remediation-free scores can be found on the Department's graduation requirements webpage.

State Testing

- 1. Earn a cumulative passing score of 18 points, using seven end-of-course state tests
 - Algebra I, Geometry, American Government, American History, English 1 and English II, Biology

2. College admission tests

 Students must earn "remediation free" scores in English language arts and mathematics on the ACT or SAT

ACT: English 18 Math 22 Reading 22 SAT: Writing 430 Math 520 Reading 450

College Admission Testing

PreACT

 Preliminary ACT for grade 10 - optional test offered on Saturday, January 26, 2019

> ACT

- For grades 11 and 12
- Recommended first sitting is junior year December test when "Test Information Release" is offered.
- Students are responsible for registering at <u>act.org</u>.
- State of Ohio will pay for ACT in the spring. All juniors will automatically be registered for this test given at Walnut Hills.

College Admission Testing

> PSAT

- For grades 9, 10, and 11 Wednesday, October 10, 2018
- Affiliation with NMSQT for grade 11

> SAT

- For grades 11 and 12
- Consider March test when "Question and Answer Service" is offered.
- Students are responsible for registering at collegeboard.org.

SAT Subject Tests

- Schedule after completing relevant AP courses
- 2 minimum if required by institution

Viewing PSAT Scores

From The College Board Website

- Log in or <u>create a free College Board account</u>.
- While signed in, go to the score reporting portal.
- Verify your personal information to view your scores.

Using a Confirmation Email

If you provided an email address during testing, you'll get a message when your scores are ready. Once you get the confirmation email:

- Follow the instructions and log in or <u>create a free College Board account</u>.
- While signed in, go to the score reporting portal.
- Use the access code from the email to view your scores.

Paper Score Report

 Towards the end of January, English teachers will receive and distribute a paper copy of your score report and your test booklet.

- Naviance is the portal through which all college application documents are transmitted as well as our most widely used means for communication!


Naviance

Myths about Colleges and College Admission

- When I went to college
- Colleges are either "good" or "bad"
- If I haven't heard of a college, it can't be very good
- Colleges need students so it is easier to be admitted
- I must have straight As to get scholarship money

Factors in College Admission

- Grades in advanced/college prep classes
- Strength of curriculum (has the student taken advantage of the curriculum offered?)
- Standardized test scores
- Overall GPA
- > Extra-curricular involvement
- Letters of recommendation
- Essays
- Demonstrated interest

How to Avoid College Tears in the Senior Year

The Student's Role

- This is a FOUR YEAR process! Be an active participant!
- Take responsibility for your academics. You don't get a chance to do 9th and 10th grade over.
- Prepare for standardized testing
- Explore extra-curricular activities

Starting GPA 2.5 for freshman year:

If sophomore, junior, and senior year you get a 3.0 (each year)

Cumulative GPA is 2.8

If sophomore, junior, and senior year you get a 3.25 (each year)

Cumulative GPA is 3.1111

If sophomore, junior, and senior year you get a 3.5 (each year)

Cumulative GPA is 3.25

If sophomore, junior, and senior year you get a 3.75 (each year)

Cumulative GPA is 3.444

If sophomore, junior, and senior year you get a 4.0 (each year)

Cumulative GPA is 3.667

Inside the Classroom

- > Identify academic strengths
- Challenge yourself

Outside the Classroom

- Explore extracurricular activities
 - Consider interests and abilities

The Takeaway

Family tasks for right now

- Begin a dialogue in which parents and students share their thoughts and feelings about the process, but limit the amount of time it dominates the conversation at home.
- Always keep in mind that it is the student who will ultimately make the decision as to which pathway s/he will follow: enroll, enlist, employ.
- Watch your pronoun confusion: "WE need to register for our SATs." "WE are still working on our essays."

Closing

Focus on what you can control:

- Continue to challenge yourself academically and earn the best possible grades
- Ensure schedule contains all courses needed to graduate from WHHS and satisfy college entrance requirements
- Begin to research college options focus on the FIT!!!
